

Ms. Wilson teaches the cello and manages a busy performance schedule in solo, chamber, and orchestral settings throughout the Atlanta, Chicago, and Charlotte metropolitan areas.





The book *James Oglethorpe, Father of Georgia* uncovers Oglethorpe's evolution from slave trader to abolitionist, propelled by intellectual relationships with two formerly enslaved black men. A compelling storyteller, **Michael L. Thurmond** is also the author of *Freedom: Georgia's Antislavery Heritage and Black Men and Women in Athens History*. As the Chief Executive Officer of DeKalb County, Thurmond has served in the Georgia Legislature, as Director of Georgia's Division of Family and Children Services, Georgia Labor Commissioner, and as Superintendent of DeKalb County Schools.



Open Hearth Cooking with Clarissa Clifton


